

Classmates, I hope you are all healthy physically, mentally well and adjusting. Take care, be well and hope to reconnect in some form for our 40th!





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
Thank goodness, we have made it to 2021.

"For me, the decision to go back to New York University Abu Dhabi (NYUAD) and live in the 38-acre campus for online classes was straightforward given the 14-hour time difference. I even felt safer returning to the United Arab Emirates (UAE), than staying in the U.S., because the UAE has put more resources into controlling the virus. For example, the Ministry of Health approved both the Pfizer and Sinopharm vaccines for public use, and it's free of charge. Since NYUAD is a small school, the main goal of the administration was to avoid an outbreak and keep the campus a bubble. Of course, we had a few positive cases throughout the semester, but with the COVID protocol, the people and their hard contacts were all isolated and recovered. Outside of classes, things felt somewhat normal. There were the constant temperature checkers, biweekly COVID tests and social gathering regulations. I found myself getting into a routine like any other semester. I was still able to do my student assistantships in the Admissions and Spiritual Life & InterCultural Education offices; and continue my falcon research in the lab. These past five months have pushed me to step out of my social comfort zone and become content with my own company. I expanded my perception of community, because I had to think about how my behavior, when I went off-campus into the city, could have a snowball effect on campus. That meant no weekend trips to Dubai or international traveling for fall break. The time that would have been spent on these activities was instead spent deepening and building connections with my friends and myself."
