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A fond aloha to **Terry Watson** Anderson, who passed away peacefully in Portland, Oregon, on March 22, 2021. Terry's classmates knew her as carefree and easygoing, but with a serious side when it mattered. English teacher Arthur Silverman, who founded Ka Punahou, spotted her talents and madeTerry a copy editor and proofreader of the student newspaper. In Terry's senior year, Ka Punahou was admitted to the national student-paper society, Quill and Scroll.

Terry enrolled at Punahou in the first grade, and took most of her vacations on Maui, as noted by her envious classmates in the 1941 Oahuan. She made it a point to make everyone around her have "a roaring good time," and her signature response to any kindness extended to her by her classmates was, "Awfully decent of you."

As with many 1941 graduates, Pearl Harbor interrupted Terry's college career. She had to drop out of the University of Hawai'i to join her sister, **Jean Watson '43** Nielsen, on a Navy convoy to the West Coast. There, she continued her education at the University of Oregon, where she met and fell in love with Les Anderson. The war soon touched Terry's life again. Les was an Army ROTC officer and the Pentagon snatched him up and sent him into the infantry battles of Europe. On Les' return in 1946, Terry met him in San Francisco, they married and settled down in Eugene, where Les finished his degree at the University of Oregon. Terry focused on the care and education of their lively brood of four, while Les managed a successful family business and served as the Mayor of Eugene.

Terry's children wrote about their vivacious, adventurous mom: "Terry loved to travel. The first overseas trip she and Les took was to Europe in 1960. On that trip, they bought a VW bug and drove around the continent. Trips over the years included England, Scotland, France, Germany, Italy, Greece, Russia, India, Japan, Hong Kong and the South Pacific.

"Trips to Bend, Oregon, were regular family outings in the 1960s. They were a 'skiing family,' so the 1968 purchase of a pole house in Sunriver allowed the family of six comfortable surroundings near Mount Bachelor and a yearround second home.

"A move to Aspen, Colorado, in the late 1970s brought new opportunities and new friends. Terry enjoyed the annual music festival scene during the summer months. She rode horses regularly and for her 65th birthday, Les bought her a horse of her own, Danny-Boy. She and Les hosted friends from around the country at the home they built in the early 1980s."

When Les passed away in 2000, Terry returned to Oregon, where she lived out the remaining years of her life close to her family.

Here's a bit of Punahou trivia: What graduate of Punahou School is the mother of a Boston Marathon winner? It's Terry, of course. A son, Jon Anderson, won the 77th Boston Marathon in 1973, the Honolulu Marathon in 1981, and represented the United States in the 1972 Munich Olympics.

Terry is survived by her sons, Jon and Rik; her daughters, Leslie and Elizabeth; her five grandchildren, three great-grandchildren and extended family. A hui hou, Terry.

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These Class notes had to be submitted in April, before Alumni Week occurred and could be reported upon. I will do so next time. Meanwhile, it's time for a bit of 1945 nostalgia involving our '46ers the year we were juniors (76 years ago!), courtesy of **Ken Hanson**'s saved issues of Ka Punahou (KP).

The front page of the May 8, 1945 Ka Punahou issue featured the winner of the Junior Damon speech contest semifinals with Barbara Butler Tate, Alison Kay, Ed Schoen and yours truly chosen to compete against the seniors the following week. (Author's note: I also have Ken's May 15 issue, and in my next junior class nostalgia note I will reveal who won. Alas, not me). The Holoku Dance was reported a huge success with student body president Miki Bowers '45 presenting a congratulatory lei to May Day Queen Haunani Kesner '45 Ackerman. A "Foon Soong" (goodbye) dance was being planned as the year's last and KP advice was: "Get that certain someone lined up early because it's bound to be a grand shindig to close a happy year." Shirley "Shay" Leebrick '41 Robinson was named the new senior Academy secretary.

This was still wartime and V-E (Victory in Europe) was big news: "Organized resistance in Germany is over." The Ka Punahou editorial suggested: "So celebrate. Buy bonds and sell them for the soldiers. Go to church, maybe; or just say thanks in a small way to those that have fought for you and won't be here to celebrate with you that mutual goal."

On the sports front, the annual track Cornell Relays ended with Punahou being a close second place to the winner, Kamehameha School. The two-mile relay won by the buff 'n blue received much KP coverage: "Taking the stick from Richard Knight, Peter Nottage pulled up from third and did some splendid running to bring his squad up to first," then Lawrie Gordon and Larry Doolittle "nosed ahead to win the exciting race for Punahou." Peter Wilson, Raymond "Rayno" Akana and Bill Dunford all won their Cornell meet sprint races. Meanwhile, the baseball team coached by Tony Morse settled on an infield of Wilfred "Pinky" Kam at first, Tommy Collins '48 at second, Koon Yoy Ching at short and Philip "Monkeyman" Chun at third." (Author's note: Years later, as an attorney, I often appeared before classmate Judge Philip Chun in his courtroom or chambers. Trust me, I always addressed him as "Your Honor" and never as "Monkeyman!")

On a final note, I have realized by writing this column, trying to keep up with classmates still here and gone that our Class records may be incomplete. Understandably, Punahou is reluctant to list a classmate as deceased without official notice (e.g., obituary or notice from family). Hence, there are 59 still on our Class List who have not deceased, which is suspect since we only graduated 125 way back in June 1946. Therefore, if you are still with us, if not wholly in body, but completely in spirit, please contact me and let me know by phone, letter or email. Also, so I can update your contact information. Malama pono (take good care).

"I enjoy the repartee with classmates on our Facebook page and look forward to maybe making the trek to Hawai'i for our 60th."



After caring for her I went to secure her back in her bassinet, and she would not let me go and howled with anguish. I could not put her down." "We landed and it came time for me to let go of my little girl. It was difficult. All these years later I would most love to meet the growing lady I held as a wee baby all those years ago." 





Bibi Fell just made the San Diego Super Lawyers list AGAIN – she's that good!




