Written by British composer George Butterworth in 1913, this classic work is based on two folk songs: *The Banks of Green Willow* and *Green Bushes*, the latter also appearing in works by Grainger and Vaughan Williams. This composition remains his most popular and is regarded as an anthem for unknown soldiers.

English Folk Song Suite Ralph Vaughan Williams

MOVEMENT I: March

English Folk Song Suite was commissioned by the band of the Royal Military School of Music. It premiered on 4 July 1923, at Kneller Hall with H.E. Adkins conducting. The first movement of the suite contains many different folk songs from the Norfolk and Somerset regions of England, including Seventeen Come Sunday, Pretty Caroline, Dives and Lazarus. Historically, the suite is considered to be a cornerstone work in wind band literature, and is regarded as one of the first "serious" works for the wind band.

MOVEMENT I: City Shuffle MOVEMENT II: Tango

PROGRAM NOTE FROM THE COMPOSER: In writing Bandancing. I wanted to fuse elements of popular dance to my own harmonic style—to write a "suite of New American Dances." The first movement, City Shuffle, is a type of funk with frequent meter changes. I intended to write a twelve-note tango bass line for the second movement, but only got ten notes out of it. The performance should by sultry and remind the listener of the dancer in the red dress in Lord of the Dance.

After her death, I found myself unable to write/compose for some time. It was during this time of grief I began writing this setting of my favorite hymn, Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing. The piece took me over a year to compose, a year I spent dealing with my grief and intensely studying the pieces that I feel represent the very best hymn-song settings in the concert band repertoire. I have never labored so long on a piece of music, but I felt this one had to be as close to perfect as I could manage. I find the words and meaning behind this beautiful hymn to be especially meaningful... it is from them, our parents, and all our forbearers from which the blessings of our lives flow.

Blue Mambo Michael Sweeney

Blue Mambo was commissioned by the Woodward Academy Middle School Advanced Band, directed by Aaron Hill. Founded in 1900, Woodward Academy is the oldest independent school in Atlanta and the largest in the continental United States. In its early years, the school had a cordial relationship with the country of Cuba, resulting in a number of Cuban students attending. Honoring this history and looking to the future, employs the mambo dance style, which developed in Cuba.
