After graduation from Punahou, she returned to Oregon to attend the University of Oregon and graduate with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. She enlisted in the Navy and served as a nurse. Betty was stationed in Virginia and then Guam during the Korean War. She continued nursing from Wisconsin to California for decades.

Betty was also devoted to the kindness of Jesus and worked hard with community

organizations, especially The Good Shepherd Church in Belmont, California where she and her husband, Floyd, made caring friendships with many.

Betty is survived by her sister, Margot Spangler '46 Krolczyk; her brother, Al Spangler; daughter, Caroline Martin; and many relatives. She will be missed by the buff 'n blue.

They traveled to Pawleys Island, South Carolina for their son's wedding and described their northern foray: "It was a wonderful weekend, and we very much support the marriage. Must admit we came home exhausted, but very glad that we went."





A fond aloha to Marilyn "Nellie" Stassen-McLaughlin, who passed away on Jan. 21, 2025. She was a former teacher who impacted the lives of many students and always pushed forward in life with strength and grace.

Marilyn "Nellie" Stassen-McLaughlin was voted "Best Sport" and "Friendliest" as a senior at Central High School in St. Paul, Minnesota an early reflection of her ability to connect with others and bring joy. Throughout her 94 years, her laughter and genuine interest in others made everyone feel valued.

For 51 years, Marilyn taught junior high students, conducted Choral Readers, and tutored, with 31 of those years at Punahou School. Many former students reached out to express how much she had impacted their lives, teaching them not only public speaking and literature, but also the joy of writing with correct grammar.

An avid writer and scholar, Marilyn published articles in The English Journal and worked for decades on research about Princess Ka'iulani. She co-authored "Princess Victoria Ka'iulani: Last Heir of the Hawaiian Kingdom" in 2024. She also enjoyed music, playing the cello, guitar and piano, and was active in sports and progressive politics.

In 1961, she moved to O'ahu as a single mother with a young daughter and no job. Despite facing many challenges, including sexism, she persevered, eventually securing a teaching position at Punahou. A determined and independent woman, Marilyn excelled in everything she did, always pushing forward with strength and grace. Above all, she was a devoted mother who instilled these same values of independence in her daughter.

Marilyn's church home was the Episcopal Parish of St. Clement, where she made history as the first woman lay reader on O'ahu. She

also served on the Vestry, in the Choir and as a Sunday School teacher, forging lasting friendships there.

She was close to her older siblings, Stewart, Bonnie and Roger, as well as her parents Lillian and Henry, all of whom predeceased her. She stayed on good terms with her ex-husband and his husband until their deaths. In 1990, she married the love of her life, Charles Mac McLaughlin and they shared 20 years of happiness with their blended family before Mac's passing. She is survived by her daughter, Martha L. A. Stassen '77 (Reggie Kennedy); step-son, Daniel McLaughlin '81 (Kathy Kozak); extended family, and many nieces, nephews, and a multi-generational set of friends.
