In her retirement, she enjoyed 20-plus years of Tai-chi, Chinese brush painting and guitar playing. Genealogy was her great interest, where she researched her heritage. Madeline also had a great passion for recipes and cookbooks - clippings filled her shelves. She will be fondly remembered for her commitment to family and friends.

Earlier this year, we were advised that **Lucius** "Lute" Colman Thompson, had passed away at 102 years of age. Our thoughts go out to his family at this time. We are sharing his obituary now, and hope to have more highlights from his life from his family in an upcoming edition.

"LuteThompson flew away to the heavens on Jan. 8, 2025, at the amazing age of 102. Our father was a kind, personable, generous and active gentlemen, but most of all a loving and exceptional father and grandfather. We say 'flew' because he was a P-38 pilot in World War II, flying 12 missions over Europe and then stationed in Bakersfield, California retraining

for the war in the Pacific. In Lute's words, 'Harry Truman dropped the bomb - ending the whole mess. I was released from active duty and here I am!'

"Lute was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, then lived in New York City with his mother, Julia Colman Thompson, until she passed, subsequently he went to live with his father, Robert O. Thompson, in Honolulu, Hawai'i. Lute attended grammar school at Punahou School and finished high school in Fountain Valley, Colorado Springs, Colorado. He attended the University of Hawai'i, University of Southern California and then later on graduated with a Bachelor of Science from Northrop Institute of Technology, California. He was an aeronautical engineer and worked for Air Research, which transferred him in 1955 to Phoenix, Arizona.

"Lute married Jackie McFaddin in 1946. He happened to see her on the corner of Hollywood and Vine, and she was kind enough to give him a lift somewhere ... into each other's hearts. He is survived by their two daughters, Deanna and Becky (Mark Smeaton); granddaughters, Lexi, Carrie and Chloe; and two great granddaughters, Emma and Madison and their father Bryan Ley. In Lute's remaining years he was blessed with two special ladies: Majie Failey of Indianapolis, Indiana until her passing, and then Patty Simmons of Phoenix, Arizona. We are eternally grateful to these ladies for sharing their lives with him. Lute's ashes are interned in Santa Maria, California joining Jackie, his wife of 55 years who passed in 2001. Celebration of his life to be held in Phoenix, Arizona. Stick & Rudder."

In the Spring 2025 issue of Punahou Bulletin, the Class of '71 sought a successor Class Correspondent. I cannot help with that but I can provide some Class of '71 news when the were Juniors, in 1970. Two 1970 Ka Punahou fall issues from the Moore family files report campus doings of Class of 1970 and 1971, including the football exploits of son, Willson "Chip" Moore III '71.

The Oct. 16, 1970, Ka Punahou featured a front-page photo of a very youthful looking Sunday Manoa trio as it performed at assembly. A headline article by **James lams '69** reports on the Punahou math team.

An article entitled "Schwein" by Lori Lum '71 caught my eye. "With much squealing and grunting a horde of hungry S.W.I.N.E. (Students Wildly Insane Near Edibles) descends upon the school cafeteria and snack bar daily. S.W.I.N.E., not necessarily in the way they eat, but in the way they line up for food. Good heavens, is there such a famine that the S.W.I.N.E. can't wait five minutes for lunch?" Caryn goes on to describe three kinds of lunch line cutters: "Yellerus wormus" as "teenyboppers" who cut in the line with nonstop idle chatter; "Muscleus brainus" are "musclebound (in head or arm) who shove in" and "Scumus comeus" who cut in line just because.

**Rick Sia**'s '71 wide ranging column, "Clear Spirit," decries the possibly harmful use of vitamins by school athletes, tells of a Pun Mathematics meet win and various sport outcomes.

"Skool Spirit," claims lower grade over emphasis to buy and wear buff'n blue on game days "or be marked down." She says: First grade teacher "orders, not suggests, the purchase of Punahou t-shirts." By Academy grades, this pressure she says results in mandatory pep rally attendance doing little more than "belittling opponents." In conclusion: "Isn't there a more sportsmanlike manner of expressing our pride in our school and football team?"

On the sports front, **Wayne Goto '71** reports the sad October loss by the Pun flag football team to University High despite the "tough Punahou defense" starring **Bob Higgins '72**, **Chip Moore '71** and **John Ripperton '71**.

The Nov. 6, 1970 Ka Punahou issue headlines Lori Lum's article "Burns Stumps" reporting on Gov. Burn's campaign speech to a full house in Dillingham Hall. Laurel "Laurie" Bowers '71 Husain has a fun front page "Kangaroo Nemesis" squib: "The finest democratic tradition of justice was exemplified in the first session of the hallowed Kangaroo Court of the revered senior class." Laurie reports however that Tim Pratt '72 "recognized the inescapable octopus arms of senior justice and pleaded guilty" and so got off lightly by having only to sport "a moustache for a day." Laurie concludes: "Perhaps the sight of two junior boys wearing spirit signs today and two other boys who acted as waiters ... will enforce in the minds of the underclassmen the determination of the seniors to protect their privileges and traditions."

Also in this November 1970 issue: **Willard Tom '70** gave post-graduation college advice and

Vernon Endo '72 had a brainy column "Policy Stated" on the Punahou Academy Students' Association student government. Kevin Browne '71 has more sports news of the Punahou Flag FootballTeam in his "CC Riders" report: Kevin first describes Chip Moore and John "J.G." Ripperton as "immortals." "This season these two defensive guards have terrorized the backfield of friends and foes alike ... J.G. still anchors the tough Pun defensive line, Chip, however, has joined the offense as its new guarterback."

"The wisdom of this switch became evident in last week's Mid-Pac game. Down 6 – 0 in the second quarter, Puns got the ball down to the Mid-Pac 25. On third down and short yardage, Chip sent his wide receiver, Wayne Goto, out on a nifty sideline pattern and rifled the ball right into his hands. The Mid-Pac cornerback desperately grabbed at Goto but the slippery left end tore free and raced in for the touchdown. For the conversion, Chip sent his receivers wide again then blasted right through on the quarter-back draw."

Heady stuff but I have no 1971 Ka Punahou issues with which to follow up on campus exploits of our son Chip's memorable Class of 1971.


